He had heard stories about Dronacharya, the royal teacher who trained the Kauravas and the Pandavas – princes of Hastinapura – in the art of warfare. One day, Ekalavya walked a long distance through forests and rivers to reach Drona's training ground. With deep respect, he bowed and said, "Guru Dronacharya, please accept me as your disciple and teach me the art of archery." Drona looked at the boy and saw that he was not of royal birth. In those days, students from royal or warrior families alone were allowed to study in royal gurukulas. Drona sadly told him, "I cannot accept you as my student. Go back to your home."

Ekalavya felt crushed but did not argue. He returned to the forest and decided that if he could not learn directly from Drona, he would still learn in spirit. He built a statue of Dronacharya out of clay and placed it under a tree. Every day, he bowed to it as his teacher and began to practice archery by himself. With determination and devotion, he practiced tirelessly – shooting arrows at targets, aiming at distant fruits, and learning from every mistake. Over time, his skill grew so sharp that he could hit a target just by hearing the sound.

One day, while Drona and the royal princes were passing through the forest, they noticed a dog sitting silently with arrows neatly placed around its mouth, stopping it from barking but not hurting it. Arjuna, Drona's favorite student, was astonished. "Who could have done this?" he asked. They followed the trail and found Ekalavya practicing. Drona was amazed at his skill and asked, "Who is your teacher?"

Ekalavya bowed and said, "You, Guru Drona. You are my teacher." Drona was taken aback. He realized this young boy had surpassed even Arjuna in skill, though he had never officially trained him. Drona had promised Arjuna that no one would ever be a greater archer than him. Bound by this promise, Drona asked Ekalavya for 'guru dakshina' – a gift given by a student to his teacher.
